APPEAL BY HUNGARIAN CHURCHES REGARDING THE ELECTIONS

and

Election Appeal of the Presidium of the Higher Consistory of the Evangelical Church A.C. of Romania

Hungarians turned out in large numbers to vote in the 2014 presidential elections. The turnout in Harghita, at 79.78% (higher than in Sibiu: 79.48%), and in Covasna, at 77.95%, were among the highest in the country. Hungarians voted heavily for Klaus Iohannis, the candidate belonging to the German minority, thus contributing to his election. For Iohannis' next run in 2019, after five years of disappointments from the President, voter turnout in the two counties was at the opposite end. Hungarians' turnout in the first round of the 2025 presidential elections was also at the bottom. These figures demonstrate the Hungarian community's ability to mobilize in Romania, but also the temptation to isolate itself when it feels betrayed.

Hungarians returned massively to the polls on May 18, 2025, in the second round of the elections for President of Romania, when the pro-European Nicuşor Dan and the extremist George Simion had remained in the race for the highest position in the state. The latter had campaigned, among other things, for the banning of ethnic parties, described members of the UDMR as "ethnic terrorists" and had made his entry into politics "by desecrating the Hungarian military cemetery in Valea Uzului" 1. This time, in Harghita, the turnout reached 59.84% and 90.75% of voters voted for Nicuşor Dan. In Covasna, where turnout reached 56.92%, Nicuşor Dan received 84.42% of the votes. Hungarians have once again helped to support democracy in Romania.

The mobilization of the Hungarian minority for the historically high-stakes elections on 18 May 2025 was made possible by the selflessness of community leaders and many other Hungarians. The involvement of the Hungarian Churches, which sent messages in favor of a pro-European vote throughout the presidential elections, deserves attention. Among the Churches, the Hungarian Unitarian Hungarian Church stood out, as it did in the past. The presidency of the Church addressed the parishioners directly, indicating the names of those who deserved the trust of the Hungarian community: in the first round, Elena Lasconi, in the second, Nicuşor Dan. This courage of making a choice is linked to the humanist ethos of the Hungarian Unitarian Unitarian Church reflected in its Statute, which "Proclaims and practices freedom of conscience and confession, openness to the knowledge of the differences between religions and world views, as well as interfaith tolerance and social justice"².

Appeal to members of the Hungarian Unitarian Church regarding the presidential elections in Romania⁴

Romania is on the brink of an historic turning point. The presidential elections will have an overwhelming long-term influence on the democratic framework of the rule of law, on the evolution of Romanian society as a whole, on the enjoyment of religious freedoms and community rights, and on Romania's international orientation.

We cannot remain indifferent to the situation created by the first round [of the elections]. We cannot expect social peace from an extremist, nationalist candidate like George Simion, who has demonstrated his violent ultras inclinations both in the Romanian Parliament and on the occasion of the many 'visits' he has made to the Heroes' Cemetery in Valea Uzului. In the unfortunate event of George Simion winning the elections, we will be faced with the gloomiest predictions, especially if, according to his declared intentions, he nominates as prime minister Călin Georgescu, who openly displays his sympathies for the legionnaires.

In this crisis, we appeal to all our parishioners to go to the polls in the second round of the elections on May 18 and to support the independent candidate Nicuşor Dan, whom we expect to ensure the much desired peaceful social coexistence of citizens and to keep the country on the European path.

We kindly ask our parishioners to vote in as large a number as possible, given the vital importance of the election results for the future of the Hungarian community, including the unimpeded functioning of our Churches, as well as for the peaceful and equitable coexistence with our Romanian brothers and sisters and with all nationalities.

We respectfully ask you to spread this appeal through all means available among your acquaintances, friends, colleagues and relatives; please also talk to those in the diaspora. Let us spare no effort, every vote counts!

Appeal to the members of the Hungarian Unitarian Church regarding the presidential elections in Romania [December 8, 2024]⁷

The unfavorable outcome of the presidential elections in Romania could have serious and unpredictable consequences on our individual and community life. There is a risk of extremely negative changes if the position of president of Romania is occupied by a person who sympathizes with leaders associated with legionary ideologies, responsible for atrocities and mass murders.

Although the political program of candidate Elena Lasconi may contain questionable aspects, we are convinced that her election is, in the current circumstances, the only real possibility to counterbalance the influence of extremist political forces.

As leaders of the Hungarian Unitarian Church, we strongly urge all believers with the right to vote to participate in the elections and to exercise their right responsibly, considering the long-term consequences for our community.
